### OHIO FIRE FACTS

There is a fire in someone's home every 30 minutes.

There were 60,260 reported fires – one every 9 minutes.

143 Ohio citizens lost their lives in fires.

The direct fire loss was over \$800M - \$91,500 every hour.

3 people were killed in fires caused by candles - \$7.2M in reported fire losses.

The number ONE cause of fires in residences – cooking related – resulted in 9 fire deaths and \$14M in fire losses.

Children playing with fire resulted in 4 fire deaths and \$6M in losses.

The number ONE cause of residential fire deaths is *smoking related* fires.

No one has died in a home protected by a working residential sprinkler system.

More people die in fires each year than all natural disasters combined.

Remember: sleep with your doors closed!

## **EMS NEWS**

RE: Privacy Notices (HIPAA)

Privacy Notices were given out to **ALL** patients as of Wednesday, December 17, 2003. This is required due to HIPAA regulations. If you do a med report on a patient with medical information on the report, you give a copy of the **privacy notices (white pad)** to them. The **acknowledgment of receipt of the notice (yellow pad)** has to be signed by patient. If the patient is unable to sign, the bottom part of the acknowledgement has to be filled out by the medic. The receipt of notice should be attached to med report and sent downtown to the EMS Administration office. The 2 pads should be kept along with the med reports on the med unit and will be available at the Fire Stockroom.

## **FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU**

Fire reports by companies have been pretty good overall. However, for the sake of consistency here are a few suggestions:

1. Inspection Number Box – put in your company number and shift.
2. ‘Use As & ‘Use Group’ – refer to the listing that was recently sent out to all stations.
3. Inspection District – Put your station number.

4. Violations/Remarks – Put the number of ‘corrective actions ordered’ in column 1 and the number of ‘areas of violation’ in column 2.
5. If your signature is hard to decipher, please print your name beside your written name. Also put your identification number.
6. The white copy of the report is sent to the Fire Prevention Bureau. The pink copy is given to the business. The yellow copy is kept by the company, it is used to keep a record of scheduled recalls. When all violations are corrected, it is then sent to the bureau.

### A Little Excel Tidbit

If you work in Excel much you’ve noticed that if you start typing a word that you typed before in the column, Excel completes the word for you after you’ve typed in the first few letters. This is very handy if you’re repeating entries often.

Another way of repeating an entry is to right click the cell, and then click **Pick from the List** on the shortcut menu. A list will display with all the entries you’ve entered before in that column and you can

choose an entry from the list, and it will be inserted in the cell. This reduces your typing and helps keep your entries consistent, which is sometimes helpful.

**Automakers are packing new cars and trucks with devices to increase safety. However, that same equipment poses danger to us.**

1. Air bags that fire off twice, or are located in doors and roofs.
2. Pre-tensioning seat belts use an explosive charge that is located inside the side posts.
3. A retractable roll bar that springs up behind the seats in some convertibles.
4. Metal detonators tucked into rooftops to inflate side-curtain air bags can go off like missiles if cut into.

"Well, he replied, "What if I do this?" And he dropped it on the ground and started to grind it into the floor with his shoe. He picked it up now crumpled and dirty.

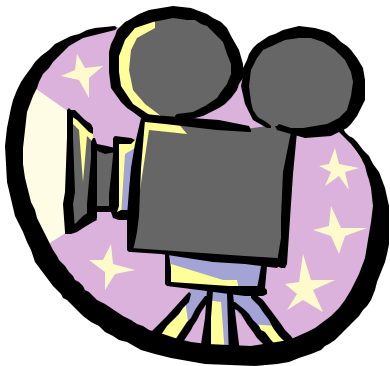
"Now, who still wants it?" Still the hands went into the air.

## Movie Reviews

### **MYSTIC RIVER**

**Starring:** Kevin Bacon, Sean Penn, Tim Robinson & Laurence Fishburne

**Director:** *Clint Eastwood*

If you're looking for a fun and uplifting film stay well away from this one. This movie starts out depressing, moves on to morose and straight into suicidal. This is actually a good story and it does keep your interest but was way to depressing for me. I will not watch this film again. To me the mark of a good movie is one you want to see over again and again.

That said, Eastwood's direction is supreme. The characters are well crafted and we care about them. But no one ends up happy. They are talking Oscar for Sean Penn but I felt that he was playing himself (I don't really like him though). I thought that Tim Robinson's character was a lot more sympathetic and had more dimension. Kevin Bacon is wonderful as always. The only truly bright spot is Laurence Fishburne who throws in a touch of humor to an otherwise very dark film.

If you're into heavy drama and like being miserable and crying by all means go see this film. The subject matter is very mature. It deals with child molestation and murder. There is a lot of foul language and violence. Do not even consider taking anyone under the age of 17 to this film. It is rated R.

### **MASTER & COMMANDER: The Far Side of The World**

**Starring:** Russell Crowe, Paul Bettany & Billy Boyd

**Director:** *Peter Weir*

This is an excellent film full of high seas adventure. I thoroughly enjoyed this film. But my mother and sister were not excited by it. There is a lot of violence and gory battle scenes, which they did not like. I don't mind the gore and enjoy a good battle scene. They thought that this was a "guy" film and I would have to agree with them. The only women in this film are a group of native girls in a boat off an

island. They are getting fresh supplies and they are on screen for maybe five minutes.

Russell Crowe was exceptional as the Commander in the title. His game of cat and mouse with the French ship's Commander is well worth watching. Also Paul Bettany, who plays the ship's doctor and is a bit of a dandy, is well worth watching. Billy Boyd gets good billing because he's coming off his run as Hobbit Pippin in "The Lord of the Rings" Trilogy but his part is not really a main character. If you're not into costumes or oceanic escapades stay home. You can almost smell the salt air and feel the bracing wind in you at your back. This is not a pirate movie. This is about a battle between a French and English vessel in the South Seas. They are at war. There are not many dull moments. Peter Weir (Lord of the Rings Trilogy) shows that he can direct something that doesn't have hobbits in it.

No children under the age of 13. They would be bored to tears. No foul language and no sex (see above, no women) but very mature subject matter. I've hoisted up the yardarm....

## THE MISSING

Starring: Tommy Lee Jones,  
Cate Blanchett & Aaron Echart  
*Director: Ron Howard*

This is a masterfully crafted thriller set in pioneer times. Cate Blanchett is Elizabeth, a tough woman, raising two

girls alone and struggling to keep her cattle ranch going in the middle of no where, with the help of two ranch hands, one of whom she is having an affair with. Tommy Lee Jones is her father, who returns in hopes of mending his relationship with her, even though he abandoned her years before. She promptly sends him packing but Indians kidnap her eldest daughter and she must seek him out for help. The remainder is a mix of action and suspense with a little supernatural Indian magic thrown in for favor. The two of them try to come to grips with each other to save Lilly the daughter. Tommy Lee Jones is wonderful and a bit enigmatic in his role a white man "turned Indian" as Elizabeth puts it. Cate Blanchett is fabulous as Elizabeth, tough yet vulnerable, she shows us many facets to her character. You see her change right before your eyes.

I always love Ron Howard's movies and this is him at his best. You get a real sense for how bad things were for the early pioneers. It makes you wonder how any of them made it. There is no strong language and only implied sex but a lot of violence makes this unsuitable for kids under 13. I am giving this one 3 alarms.
